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Project Overview

The Liberia Women Empowerment Project (LWEP) is a three-year project implemented by the Ministry of Gender, Children and Social Protection (MGCSP) through Plan International Liberia (the lead Service Provider), six association members; Catholic Relief Services (CRS), Actionaid Liberia (AAL), Medica Liberia, Defence for Children International Liberia Chapter (DCI), Foundation of Community Initiatives (FCI), and Kids Engagement Education Project (KEEP), and two professional service providers (Viamo and Raising Voices). The project is a US\$44.6 million multi-sectoral initiative to address key barriers to gender equality in Liberia. It aligns with the Liberian government's priorities on Women's empowerment and GBV prevention and responses. LWEP is funded by the World Bank - International Development Agency (IDA). The project runs for three years, from 2024 to September 2027.


Project Objective

The overall objective of the LWEP is to improve social and livelihood services for women and girls in targeted communities, foster positive social norms, and strengthen the government's capacity to advance women and girls' empowerment through a 'whole community' approach targeting multiple actors and levels.

Sept, 2024 - 2025 – Key Results Summary

■ Community Mobilization & Engagement

- 498 communities identified; 460 mobilized and reached (92% coverage).
- 23,688 participants engaged:
 - 6,380 men
 - 12,373 women
 - 4,854 youth
 - 81 people with disabilities
 - 1,970 women leaders
 - 579 key stakeholders
 - 192 religious leaders

Liberia Women Empowerment Project (LWEP)

■■ Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM)

- 422 GRCs established (community, county, and national levels).
- 541 GRC members trained in Montserrado & Gbapolu.
- Training reached: 241 participants in Gbapolu (169 women, 72 men), 300 participants in Montserrado (180 women, 120 men).
- 140 grievance boxes delivered (80 Montserrado, 60 Gbapolu).

■ Communication & Citizen Engagement

- Comprehensive Communications & Citizens Engagement Strategy finalized.
- SASA! Together and livelihoods education materials distributed.
- 340 influencers (leaders, youth, women, PWDs) engaged for advocacy.

■■■■■ Capacity Building

- 73 out of 75 CBAs recruited and active.

■ Challenges Identified

- 38 communities pending replacement.
- Access constraints in Belleh District due to poor road networks.
- Delays in MIS access and log frame updates.
- Some community members declined participation, delaying replacements.

INCEPTION WORKSHOPS

These took part in the period of the first quarter October—December 2024 at Golden Key Hotel. There after a series of follow meetings were held at various venues with all three consortium members including Plan International Liberia, Catholic Relief SERVICES AND ActionAid Liberia.



On boarding meetings took place in Corina Hotel. All Service Providers Organizations staff members were present . Key highlights were based on the project staff members , Key components each service provider organizations is implementing, the meeting lasted three days. Service provider organizations included; Plan International Liberia, ActionAid Liberia, Catholic Relief Services Liberia, Foundation for Community hitiatives, Defense for Children international, Medica Liberia, and Kids Engagement Education Liberia . Technical Providers VIAMO and Riasings joined virtually.



Community Mobilization & Engagement

To date a total of the following have been achieved

- ⇒ **498 communities** identified; **460 communities mobilized and reached** (92% coverage).
- ⇒ A total of **23,688 participants engaged**, including:
 - 6,380 men , 12,373 women, 4,854 youth, 81 people with disabilities, 1,970 women leaders, 579 key stakeholders and 192 religious leader

Actionaid with assistance from Plan international conducted series of community engagement activities, including community mobilizations, orientation trainings, verifications, and the establishment of Grievance Redress Committees, took place beginning in May 2025. Currently, ActionAid Liberia (AAL) is conducting Grievance Redress Committee trainings across all six counties. To date, Gbarpolu has successfully completed the trainings, while Montserrado is nearing completion. AAL will soon begin training the committees in Grand Cape Mount, Grand Gedeh, River Cess, and Bomi counties.

Community orientations, verifications, and the establishment of Grievance Redress Committees were conducted simultaneously across all six counties as part of the acceleration plan. This approach was designed to expand the project's implementation scope and accelerate spending, given the remaining implementation period and the number of activities yet to be completed.




Challenges



Photo on the Left

Reaching remote communities remains a major challenge. In areas with limited facilities, transportation often relies on ferries or canoes to cross rivers for workshops and activities. However, the safety of this mode of transport is high-risk, as passengers typically lack life jackets or proper safety equipment. While alternative routes exist, they also present significant safety and security concerns.

An ActionAid vehicle became stuck after failing to cross a wooden bridge and fell into a hole. The driver was forced to spend the night alone in the vehicle in the middle of the forest, while the other staff members sought refuge in the nearest town. It took two full days for the vehicle to be removed, causing program activities to be delayed by the same duration. Depending on vehicle condition and available transport alternatives, such incidents could potentially lead to even longer delays in project implementation.
